Program

On The Move

Healthy physical development requires plenty of fun opportunities for children to move their bodies each day. Physical activity of all kinds has a powerful influence on children's overall development.

A morning walk through the program provides these examples of Fruit & Flower children on the move:

Babies in the Infant Center often move their bodies to the music their caregivers play. It is even more pleasurable if there is a rattle to shake or something to bang loudly. Today's selection is a classical piano piece. Later, it might be zydeco, tango, or some country music.

Room Six children perfect their skills by moving around the larger open area. Some are pushing a chair, some are carrying a ball, and some are efficiently scooting along the floor on their bottoms.

Children in Room One do finger plays at their circle time. Following along to the hand movements of *Itsy Bitsy Spider* and *Twinkle Twinkle* can help to develop the smaller muscles in their hands and fingers.

Room Two children are taking turns doing a little dance called the 'Room Two Hop' while their friends clap and sing a little song that includes their names.

Children in Room Three, when they are the "name -caller", hit the hand drum once for each syllable in the names of their friends. Children respond at the end of outdoor time by heading inside to remove their coats and shoes.

Room Four children are working on changing the sheets on their cots. They are working together to move the cots in and out of the workroom. They are using small muscle skills to attach the sheets.

Room Five is outdoors. They are running, riding, climbing, crawling and digging in the sand.

Physical development, intellectual development, communication, building strong relationships, and development of self confidence: these are all benefits of the movements, actions, motions, and gyrations of an active day at Fruit & Flower!

DID YOU KNOW?

- ✓ Fruit and Flower is open 250 weekdays per year.
- ✓ When asked on a survey last spring, 98.6% of our respondents agreed (9.6%) or strongly agreed (89%) that they would recommend Fruit & Flower to a friend or family member.
- ✓ 95.7% of those respondents indicated that they prefer receiving communications from Fruit & Flower through e-mails. We are so happy to save the trees!
- ✓ "By age 4, children already understand two-thirds to three-quarters of the words they will use in future daily life." (Quoting from *The Read Aloud Handbook*, by Jim Trelease.)

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(From Multnomah County Library's "Help Your Child Get Ready to Read")

- "Brain development research shows that reading aloud to your child every day *increases his brain's capacity for language and literacy skills* and is **the most important thing you can do to prepare him for learning to read.**"
- "Early Literacy" is a baby who chews on a book, a toddler who wants her favorite book read over and over, and a preschooler who "reads" a story to you from memory."
- "Parents who talk with their children, read lots of books and magazines to their children, and encourage play activities that involve language, prepare their children for learning to read when they begin school."
- "Children learn to talk, read, and write through social literacy experiences – singing nursery rhymes, listening to stories, having conversations with adults who listen and respond, and interacting with literacy materials such as books, magazines, markers, and paper."

## Health Food Tip from the Oregon Environmental Council:

Replace any fruit juice (even 100%) with water and a piece of whole fruit. Fruit juice provides calories with little nutrition and contributes to cavities. Whole fruit is nutrient-rich and a great source of fiber. Water is free and healthy. At Fruit & Flower, we have been serving water instead of juice with our afternoon snacks. Afternoon snacks have also become less sweet and more focused on protein, fruit, and vegetables.

## Eco-Healthy Cleaning Tip

Going back to the original naturally derived ingredients is a way to make cleaning products that work, don't pollute, and save you money. Most are found in your kitchen cupboards.
